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Good morning ladies and gentlemen,

Welcome to the Ninth International Conference: Language, Development and Identity.

As with the previous eight conferences, this conference is hosted by ITB Language Centre in collaboration with the British Council in Jakarta and the University of Leeds in the United Kingdom.

The link with the British Council in Jakarta started in 1987, when the British government granted scholarships for ITB English lecturers to study in Britain to get the Master's degree, and to join courses in various British universities. In 1991 ITB and the University of Gajah Mada made an official link with the University of Leeds for the improvement of three strands of language education, teaching materials, testing development, and teaching methods. The collaboration between ITB and the University of Leeds continued even after the official link ended. With the knowledge and some experience we had, we agreed to the suggestion made by Mr. Hywel Coleman to hold an international conference. The first conference took place in 1995.

This conference is special in that it focuses not only on English education, but also on the education of national and local languages. Therefore, in this conference there will be interpreters for English and Indonesian language, as some presentations will be delivered in English, and some others in Indonesian. Thanks to the British Council for providing the interpreters.

The participants of this conference come from various institutions in Indonesia as well as overseas. They come from educational institutions from several cities in Indonesia, and from eight countries: Timor Leste, Malaysia, Thailand, the Philippines, Cambodia, India, Denmark, and the United Kingdom. There were 90 papers submitted, 34 of which will be presented in 6 plenary sessions and 9 parallel sessions

On this occasion, I would like to thank those who have made this conference possible, the Rector of ITB and staff for their support, the British Council for being our counterpart and for the assistance, technically and financially. Our gratitude and appreciation goes to Mr. Hywel Coleman, the Senior Lecturer at the School of Education, and University of Leeds for his endless support and assistance for at least 21 years. The committee also thanks the presenters and participants of this conference, the sponsors and the representatives from various institutions, the publishers and some other parties. To the members of the committee, thank you guys for your hard work. Keep the spirit up!

Finally, I wish you all a fruitful conference and pleasant stay in Bandung.

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Opening Address

The School of Education of the University of Leeds, UK, has been collaborating with the Language Centre of ITB, the Bandung Institute of Technology, since 1991.

Between 1991 and 1997 the collaboration consisted of staff exchange visits leading to joint research and publications. This activity was supported by funds from the UK Higher Education Link scheme administered by the British Council.

In 1995 the School of Education, the ITB Language Centre and the British Council in Indonesia organised the first National Conference on English Language Teaching in Universities in Indonesia. This event responded to a need in the field of English language teaching in Indonesia for a focused and high quality conference at which issues relating to ELT could be explored.

So successful was the first conference that the same three partners have continued to work together to organise national conferences approximately once every two years since then. The organisers have maintained their commitment to having a very specific focus for each conference. They have also insisted on quality and relevance as the main criteria for the selection of papers.

The theme of the Ninth National Conference, which takes place from 26th to 28th June 2012, is 'Language, Development and Identity'. For the first time, the scope of the conference is being extended to include all languages, not only English. Also for the first time conference papers will be presented either in English or in Bahasa Indonesia.

Unfortunately I am not able to join you in person for this event. However, I am very pleased that my colleagues, Prof Mike Baynham and Dr Martin Lamb, will be presenting papers there. I am also delighted that the University of Leeds has been able to sponsor the participation of two of its Indonesian alumni who will also be presenting papers.

I would like to congratulate the conference organisers on their hard work yet again and I send my best wishes for another fruitful meeting to all presenters and participants.
