# Implementation of Development Policy for LivestockFarming Business in Gorontalo Regency, Gorontalo,Indonesia

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#### **ABSTRACT**

The purpose of this study is to analyze and determine the implementation stages of livestock farming development policies in Gorontalo Regency, which are regulated by the Minister of Agriculture's Decree and administered at both district and provincial Level. The success of policies implementation lies in the commitment of implementation both by the apparatus and the community. This qualitative research used casestudymethod. While the datawerecollected from observation during the beginning and process of research. In addition, the data and information related to the research were collected by conducting in-depth interviews, a literature study was also conducted on varying references and documents to collect a valid data which will be processed and analyzed with qualitative analytic methods, including data presentation and drawing conclusions. The validation of all information were from extended observations, additional references, data triangulation, and group discussions. The findings showed that the implementing process of the development policies included socialization, cage preparation, identification of prospective recipient farmers, formation of farmer groups, breeds procurement and selection, distribution, as well as raising and redistribution of livestock. The intended output of this policy can be accomplished if every apparatuses of implementation are consistent so that the policy can be implemented properly, which in turn will improve the Farming community Income in Gorontalo Regency

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#### INTRODUCTION

Agricultureisanimportantsourceofincomeforthemajority of the population [1], and as a leading sector, itplays an important role in the Indonesian The aim of national agricultural development needs to be knownbytheruralandurbancommunities. This is because theres ponsibilitiesofthegovernmentaretoensure food security, increase income and employmentopportunities in rural communities [2]. developmentofagricultureinruralandremoteareasisoneoft heefforts to equalize growthforthe entirecommunity tobenefitfromtheresults. Therefore, the government is sued various policies to guide the achievement of theobjectives. These policies will succeed as long as the target community and implementation apparatus are consistent.LITERATUREREVIEW

The requirement of this implementation is based on the need to analyze several policies. The target group compliance is a significant factor which determines the policy implementation success as viewed from behavioral perspective, [3].

KnownastheFarmingandLivestockBusinessDevelopmentP roject(Putkati). it has been implemented in almost every region of Indonesia, including Gorontalo Regency, Thissectorisamajorcontributortofoodsecurity, and is an important component of livelihood formostpeople[4]. Furthermore, this policy has been implemented since the 2000s, and is still in existence till now, although with adifferent name. It was regulated in a Decree from the MinisterofAgriculture and was followedup with policies in regional level. Policy makers need to collectively managethe cities and rural areas to ensure that food production, consumption, and waste are treated as one single system [5]. #### **METHODOLOGY**

Thisisaqualitativeresearchthatusedacasestudymethod.Int hiscase, theresearchtriedtorevealandanalyzephenomenat hatarerelatedtotheprocessofimplementingfarmingdevelo pmentpolicies. Fortheeffectivenessoftheresearchprocess, BoliyohutoandMootilango which were successful at developing livestockfarmingwhereused, aswellastwosubdistricts that were less successful, Bongomeme and Tibawa, a stheresearch locus.

Data were collected through observation techniques, indepthinterviewswithrespondentsrelatedtotheresearchfoc us.Thedocumentationwascarriedout byreviewing documents, references, and the policies ofdevelopinglivestockfarming. The sourcewas primary data in the form of interviews with the Head of AnimalHusbandryService,theHeadofthePutkatiProjectSec tion, the Putkati technical and medical officers, as wellas thetargetcommunity.Furthermore,secondarydatawereobt ained in theform ofpolicies, andtechnicalguidelines.

The data was validated through the process of prolongedfieldobservations, focus group discussion, datatri angulation, and adding related references. The analysis was seen as three concurrent streams of activities, which are: (1) data condensation, (2) display, and (3) conclusion drawing or verification [6].

#### RESULTSANDDISCUSSION

The development program was implemented to increase community income. Economic growth and equitable distribution of income are two of the five main macroe conomic goals that each country aim to achieve, and are related to economic development [7]. Sustainable

This is closely related to thedevelopment policies and programs implemented by thegovernment.

The Gorontalo Regency is flanked by most of the cities intheProvince.Thisareaisastronomicallylocatedatcoordina tes 1210,159" – 1230, 32" East Longitude and00,24" – 100,02" North Latitude, with an area of 2,125.47km². In the north bordering North Gorontalo Regency, inthe east bordering Bone Bolango and Gorontalo City, inthe west bordering Boalemo, and in the south borderingTomini Bay. Administratively, Gorontalo Regency consistsof 19 sub-districts [8]. Data on the area of sub-districtscanbe seeninthe followingtable.

Thephenomenonofincomeandwealthinequalityconsequen ces has always been at the center of economicand social policy debates [9]. This is the same as whathappened in Gorontalo Regency, which has a significantlevel of poverty compared to other regions. Apparently,povertyisoneofthemostcommonproblemsinth eworld, especially in developing countries [10]-. In fact, thepovertyrateinGorontaloRegencyishigherthantheavera ge in the province. Based on data released by theCentralStatisticsAgency(BPS),inMarch2019,thepovert yratewasonly15.52%ordecreasedby0.31%fromSeptembe r2018.Basedonthispercentage,thenumberofpoorpeoplein theprovincedecreasedfrom

188.30inSeptember2018to186.03inMarch2019.Meanwhile, the poverty rate from 2015 - 2019 was veryhigh between 18-21 percent [8].Therefore, this rate canbe used to measure the level of community welfare. It canbesaid thatthelevel ofwelfare in this Regency is stilllow. This is one of the phenomena that generally occur.

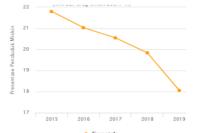

concluded that a griculture is their main source of livelihood. The people of the community are engaged in different forms of a griculture, such a srice, and livestock.

Animal husbandry has many roles in the livelihoods ofpeopleindevelopingcommunities[12]Thepolicyoflives tockfarmingbusinessisparttheFarmingandLivestockBus inessDevelopmentProjectwhichwasimplementedinEast ernIndonesia(Putkati).GorontaloRegencyisoneofthetar getareasforfarmingdevelopment. Also, this project is assisted by the DirectorGeneral ofAnimal Husbandry, Ministry of Agriculture. ItisalsojointlyfundedbytheGovernmentoftheRepublic



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of Indonesia, IFAD (International Fund Agricultural Development), IDB (Islamic Development Bank) as well as Grant Agreement from the Government of New Zealand.

The main objectives of this policy are to distribute anddevelopthecattlegiventofarmers, andtofosterintegrate d farming. Furthermore, this project has the task of developing and distributing horticultural seeds, plant a tion crops, an imalfeed for age and others to farmers. The objectives of this farming business development projectare: (1) increasing the income of low-

incomefarmers,(2)developingfarmingasanintegratedbusi nessunit,(3)utilizinglandresourcesefficientlyandeffectivel y,(4)increasingcattlepopulation, and (5) equalizing farmers' income throughthe distribution of livestocktorelativelypoorfarmers.

The current development agenda emphasizes the need toachieveabalancebetweeneconomic,social,andenvironm entaldimensionsofsustainabledevelopment[13]. Therefore, each activityrequirescoordinatedandintegrated planning between related subsectors such aslivestock, food crops, horticulture and plantations, usingvertical andhorizontal approaches. Bottom-

upplanningisassociatedwithaverticaltop-

downpolicy. This approach was intended to create a coordination and synchronization between the Central and Local Governments. Thus, the flow of information runs smoothly and increases understanding of the tasks and responsibilities of the project implementation. Also, this approach was implemented by each agency related to the work line, starting from the central to the field level (farmers).

In [14] showed that the livestock raising system in NorthSulawesi is still done in a "traditional-wide" manner usingthe "crop-

livestockintegration" model.Gorontalo Regencyasanareath atwasoncepartoftheNorthSulawesiprovince, hasthesamec haracteristics, especially in the development of agricultural businessesthat are integrated with livestock. In this case, the policiesimplemented by local governments have almost the sameproblems, especially in dealing with failures in livestockfarmingdevelopment. Theeffortstodeveloplivestockfarmingareveryimportant and can increase the community income. Thisneedsto besupported bydataon agricultural policiessuitableforthe community.strengthening data qualityandquantity which is available to decision makers, which includes actors in private and public sector, isaprerequisiteto

The reality found was that the process of implementingthe development policies was not in accordance with the expected outcome. The success of policy implementation could be identified from the process perspective along with the results attained (results perspective). In the processperspective, a program by the government issaidto be accomplished when implementations are in instructionsandprovisions from theprogrammaker, which include the procedures, implemen tingagents, target groups and program benefits. Finally, the program can be considered a success if the desired impact happens. However, a program might seem to be accomplished in process perspective, but was failed in produced impact and versa[3].Severalareastargetedbytheprojecthavehaddiffere ntformofsuccess.Somesub-

districtswerefoundtoeffectivelydeveloptheirlivestockfarm ing,whilesomeareas failed. In this research, it was determined that therewere two sub-districts that succeeded in developing theirlivestockfarmingbusiness,namelythedistrictsofBoliyo huto and Mootilango. Meanwhile, Bongomeme andTibawa, which were also designated as the locus in thisstudywere lesssuccessful.

On the basis of the same policy, all the beneficiary farmergroups in the sub-district who became the research

locusachievedthesamelevelofsuccess. Theresultoftheadopt ed public policy depends on how successfully it isimplemented. Even the best policy is meaningless whennotproperly implemented [16]. This phenomenonattracts researchers to conduct a deeperstudy of the processo fimplementing development policies. Therefore, scientificrese archaese enconducted to show the causes of un successful processes in policy implementation. In this case, the research focus are the stages or processes of implementing the development policies.

The success rate of development policies can be assessed through the process or stages of policy implementation. It can also be measured through the impact of the policies on increasing lives tock farmers' incomes.

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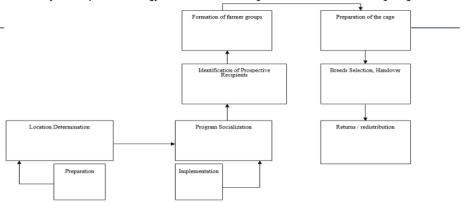


Figure 2. Schema of the stages of implementing farming business development policies

Aftersocialization,thelocationoflivestockfarmingdevelop ment was determined. From the several regions,Gorontalo Regency is the area with several subdistricts.Thedevelopmentlocationwasdeterminedfromthe onset,and theprospective recipients have started preparing in naccordance with the provisions. This determination was done by considering the location and the extent of the expanse owned by the village.

Basedontheresultsofinterviewsandobservationsduring the research process, thestages of socialization and location determination was conducted in accordance with technical guidelines. After several considerations of the natural resources, potential of the population and itsgeographicallocation, Boliyohuto, Bongomeme, Mootilan go and Tibawa Sub-districts were designated as the locations of farming development. Furthermore, the area and the number of villages or hamlets in the location werevery supportive in the development process.

#### $Identification of Prospective\ Live stock Recipients$

Theprocessofidentifyingprospectiverecipientswilldetermi ne the success of the implemented policies. Also, introduction into the target community needs to be carried out fromthe beginning, because thesuccess ofthispolicy islargelydetermined by the community or farmer groups receiving the assistance. Frominterviewswithseveralrespondents, it was observed th at the process of identifying prospective recipientcarried out through deliberation, and theideal form of deliberation method was to avoid violence[18]. conducted to identify Deliberation was prospective recipients and avoid data manipulation. Therefo re, the selected farmers were in accordance with the predetermined criteria. The deliberation was attended bythe village or community, sub-district government, and officials from the Animal Husban dry Department.Furthermore,communitymembers,technicalofficers, task forces, and village officials conducted a direct checktoverifythe selectedfarmers.

### Formation of Farmer Groups and Preparation of CattleCages

Improving the qualityofhumanresources(HR) in farmersandtheirfamilies is one of the development activities, with the purpose to improve their skills, knowledge, and attitudes. This will enable them to develop agriculture into a state more productive and improve theirfamilies welfare at the same time [19].Thedevelopmentofan

agriculturalsectorintegratedwithlivestockisbetterwheniti scarried out through the empowerment of farmer groups. The first aspect that needs to be considered is the formation of groups that are prepared to receive livestock assistance. This is done by paying attention to the area or expanse where the farmers reside, which will

help thefield officers to conduct training and supervise them. One of the factors that determine the institutional

Inthiscase, the group was formed after the recipient farmers were determined. In principle, the formation of an initial recipient farmer and are distributed farmer group have the same procedure. The only difference is determining the number of recipients in each group. The initial group (core) consisted of 25 heads of households and the redistributed recipient consisted of 10

families.Meanwhile,farmergroupadministratorswerede termined, which consisted of a chairman, secretary andtreasurer.Furthermore,itwasnecessarytoprepareliv estockcagesaccordingtopredeterminedcriteria.Farmers whohave beenselected as recipients needtopreparelivestockcages.Theconstructionofacageis accompaniedbytechnicalofficersandgroupadministrato rs.

Preparation of livestock cages was mutually constructed and adjusted the established criteria. In this case, abriefing was given about the techniques of growing animal feed forage, which requires the farmers to have at least 0.25 hectares of land. Also, the recommended type of plantwaselephant grass. With this condition, the development is expected to encourage an increase dincome of the community, especially farmers who received lives to ckassistance

## ${\it BreedsProcurement, Selection, Distribution and Raisin} \ gPeriod of Livestock$

Thebreedsprocurementandselectionareimportantstage sthatsupportsuccessfuldevelopment.

Thisstagelastedforthreemonths,fromtheprocess of procuring and selecting livestock breeds to its

farmers. The breeds were selected by the selector team, transported to the location (holding ground), and distributed to recipient.

Beforedistribution,livestockidentitywasperformed,whi ch was carried out by personnel from the contractor,and was supervised by a technical team from

DistrictService.Livestockthatalreadyhaveanidentitywer egiven an Ear Tag, and immediately distributed to farmersaccordingtotheir groups.

#### Duringthe

raising period, the contractor still provides medical person neltomonitor the animal health. The medical personnel werealwaysreadytocareforthelivestock. Also, distributed animals were continuouslymonitored by the task force in each village. In this case, the task force helpful in the was very care raisingprocess.Thus,itcanbeconcludedthatdistributedli vestockhavegonethroughaprocurementprocess, strictse lectionandraisedbyfarmers. This stage will determine the success of implementing developmentpoliciesoflivestockfarming.

#### Returnor RedistributionofLivestock

The final stage is the return or redistribution of livestock,and it refers to the contract agreement by the farmers with the Putkati project. This contract was initially validfor a period of 7 years in accordance with

statement from the donor country handling this project. In its development, there was a change in the contract to 5 and 3 years, in accordance with the conditions of the development area.

In the process of redistribution, problems usually occur, either from the livestock such as majir (cannot repro

From the explanation above, it was concluded that the process of returning or redistributing livestock had been carried out in accordance with established procedures. Although there were few obstacles, but they do not affect the process of redistribution to the next group. This condition encouraged the development of livestock given to farmers. Also, diversification and increase in livestock productivity need to be part of poverty alleviations trategy indeveloping countries [21].

#### CONCLUSIONS

The development of livestock farming is one of the alternatives used by the government to increase people'sincome. Therefore, it is necessary to issue policies that regulate the process both at the central and regional levelsThe success of this policy is largely determined by the implementation process. The commitment of the implementing apparatus and the target community also determines the sustainability of the policy. In accordance with the research findings, there are severalstages in the process of implementing the policies, such as program socialization, identification of prospectiverecipientfarmers, formation of farmer groups, preparation, breeds procurement, selection, distribution, and redistribution. As long as all theim plementation stages of this policy are properly conducted,the development will be successful have an impact on increasing the income of the farming comm

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
